#### **MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL**

#### The Earth is the Lord's

Dear Parents,

Catechisms were seen as very important many years ago. For example, in my childhood the Catholic Catechism was a really big thing throughout my own schooling as a little Catholic kid.

A Catechism is a detailed statement of faith. It is a document, usually presented as a small book, that explores the implications and details of Christian belief. It is like a manifesto or a summary that clarifies what the people who follow that faith actually believe.

Historically there are quite a few different Catechisms. They vary on fairly minor details depending on whether the underlying doctrine was Catholic, Protestant, Anglican, Reformed, Presbyterian or whatever. And that's all a bit boring. But... there is one rather famous statement that appears in all of them. It is originally written in old fashioned English, here it is:

"Man's chief end is to glorify God and enjoy Him forever."

Let's swap out that nerdy old-style language and say it like this:

"People's most important reason for living is to glorify God and enjoy Him forever."

That's better. That's easier to understand, but just one minute; is that right, does that make sense? Is God really to be enjoyed? Isn't God some judgemental old guy watching from the sky, with a long beard and a big stick, waiting to whack us humans when we do something wrong?

Well, because we are Bible-believing Christians, we do not see God that way at all. Here's why...

The amazing scenario is retold in the part of the Bible called the New Testament. It tells us that God himself, in human form turns up on earth. God, fully God and yet fully human, turns up on earth and he's a totally honest, down-to-earth, good bloke who loves his mum and looks after his mates.

Children want to be near him, they hang around him. Other grown-ups want to chase the kids away, but not this God-bloke, he loves kids. And children know things. Children can tell pretty quickly if a grown-up is genuinely nice or not. This God-guy, he's nice.

During his time on earth in human form God goes by the name 'Jesus'. His mates love him. Wrongdoers choose to change their ways when they meet this guy. The thieving tax-official drops everything and never steals again when he meets this guy. A dead bloke called Lazarus goes to all the effort of coming back to life just to be reunited with this guy. People LOVE this guy Jesus because he is just such a kind, loving, selfless, listening, caring good guy.

I'm a Christian, a follower of the teachings of this Jesus. I'm really happy to spend my time glorifying God and enjoying Him forever.

At the end of last term, I wrote about the Peace-Wise program that the College uses. For the next few weeks, I will continue with this and unpack the twelve key principles for Young Peacemakers. The first four principles belong to the same section – Understanding Conflict.

- 1. CONFLICT IS A SLIPPERY SLOPE
- Students will understand what conflict is and how they can respond to it
- If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone. Romans 12:18
- 2. WHAT CAUSES CONFLICT?
- Students will understand what causes

conflict and that there are some good reasons for conflict

- Conflict starts in the heart
- What causes fights and quarrels among you? Don't they come from your desires that battle within you? You want something but don't get it. James 4:1-2
- 3. CHOICES HAVE CONSEQUENCES
- Students will understand the relationship between choices and consequences
- Just as choices belong to us, so do their consequences
- Do not deceive yourselves; no one makes a fool of God. A man will reap exactly what he plants. Galatians 6:7
- 4. MAKING CHOICES THE RIGHT WAY
- Students will discover the importance of

thinking about their choices before making them  $% \left\{ \mathbf{n}_{i}^{\mathbf{n}}\right\} =\mathbf{n}_{i}^{\mathbf{n}}$ 

- Wise-way choices are better than my-way choices
- The wisdom of the prudent is to give thought to their ways. Proverbs 14:8

Once children understand what conflict is and how it grows, they can learn how to settle arguments and fights independently. Together, let us make it one of our aims that we help our children find a better way to make choices in the first place, as their consequences will come from these choices – be they positive or negative. We have a real opportunity to teach a lifelong skill here. Praise God.

## SECONDARY UPDATE

Welcome back to Term 3. I want to remind all our Secondary families about the Tutoring Program that we offer every Wednesday at no cost.

Excellence is a Core Value of our College and we encourage students to improve their learning and become excellent in their studies. Because of this, all secondary teachers offer tutoring to extend students in their learning every Wednesday after the official school day concludes.

These sessions start at 3:40pm and finish at 4:30pm. There are two types of tutoring offered, they are:

# **General Tutoring**

General Tutoring is offered by all teachers across all subjects and students can decide on the day to

attend any General Tutoring session. So parents know that students have attended these sessions, students' diaries will be stamped with a red 'attending tutoring' stamp.

## Specialised Tutorial 'Tute' Groups

The College also offers specialised tutoring through small Tutorial 'Tute' Groups. These groups focus on the development of certain skills. Students are invited to attend a Tute Group by tutorial teachers. Tute Groups are capped at 12 students to assist in the delivery of tailored and targeted support. These groups run for four consecutive weeks and requires a commitment from the student to attend all sessions. Each Tute Group has its own attendance roll and an email will be issued to the parents should an enrolled

student fail to attend.

And of course we have our supervised Homework Hub in the Library Resource Centre every Monday through to Thursday. This service is also available from 3:40pm until 4:30pm. This is a silent space where students can undertake independent learning and can utilise the centre's computers.

All of our secondary teachers are involved in the Tutoring Program, so if you have any questions, please feel free to direct your queries to your child's Homeroom Teacher or Subject Teacher/s.

# SCHOOL STUDENTS WITH DISABILITY

# Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Dear Parents, Guardians and Carers,

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about support provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the NCCD guidelines (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support

provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any

testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information.
